ADMINISTRATION / LEADERSHIP

Senior Associate Dean, Franklin College, UGA, 2023-2024

Major responsibilities:

- Leadership of twelve humanities units comprising 200+ faculty, 1000+ majors and grad students, and 125,000+ credit hours (Departments of Classics, Comparative Literature and Intercultural Studies, Germanic and Slavic Studies, History, Linguistics, Philosophy, Religion, and Romance Languages; African Studies Institute; Center for Asian Studies; Latin American and Caribbean Studies Institute; Institute for Native American Studies)
- Oversight of faculty affairs for 1000+ faculty in the college (hiring and retention, promotion and tenure, grievances, faculty recognition, reappointments and searches for department heads)
- Leadership development for faculty and administrators in the college
- Strategic budget planning (>\$130M) with the Dean and the Senior Director of Finance and Administration
- Representation of the dean's office when the Dean is unavailable

Major achievements:

- With fellow Associate Dean Marshall Shepherd: submitted NEH proposal to establish a Center for Data Criticism at UGA, involving twenty-three faculty in the humanities, social sciences, computer science, and law (\$1M project, ultimately unfunded)
- With fellow Associate Dean Paula Lemons: developed and ran a two-year pilot program for service workload equity to make service more transparent, accountable, and rewarded among faculty in the college (involving thirteen departments in the arts, humanities, social sciences, life sciences, and physical and mathematical sciences)
- Coordination of operations among dean's office leadership for strategic review and reform of (among other things) indirect cost return, cost-share for startup funding, compensation of faculty administrators, supporting mid-career faculty, and program development in the School of Computing and Institute for Artificial Intelligence
- Developed program for research-intensive semesters for college faculty

Associate Dean, Franklin College, UGA, 2021-2023

Major responsibilities:

- Leadership of humanities units (as above)
- Management of the college's international portfolio: review of study abroad and field study programs, review of partnership proposals and student study abroad scholarship applications, coordination with Office of Global Engagement on seed-grant programs for international short-term exchanges, oversight of international operating budget and foundation accounts for international education
- Oversight of Experiential Learning, SACSCOC accreditation compliance, Academic Program Reviews, and student learning outcomes for the college

Major achievements:

- Established the UGA Humanities Seminar, a two-year pilot program for mid-career faculty to foster cross-disciplinary thinking and humanities advocacy (internal funding: \$50,000 per FY)
- Created and supervised the college's first administrative position for internship and career coordination for students, targeting the humanities

Head of the Department of History, UGA, 2019-2021

Major responsibilities:

- Leadership of ~ 30 faculty members, 4 administrative staff, 40 grad students, 300 majors, 100 minors
- Coordination with directors of undergraduate and graduate studies and regular communication with the department's policy, personnel, travel, and search committees
- Authority over department's operating budget (\$50,000), travel budget (\$20,000), instructional budget (\$630,000), discretionary account (\$150,000), and 27 endowed accounts (\$100,000, excluding professorships); cultivation of relationships with donors
- Oversight of hiring, promotion, and tenure processes at the departmental level; annual evaluation of faculty and business manager

Major achievements:

- Guided the department through the peak pandemic years, while maintaining continuity in instruction and communication as protocols shifted
- Oversaw the successful promotion of six faculty members in two years (four to Associate Professor, two to Professor) and the successful hire of three Assistant Professors
- Coordinated department-wide DEI initiatives (workshops for grad students on time management and self-care, funding for summer writing workshop to support grad students finishing their theses, diversity training for TAs, elimination of GRE requirement for applicants to grad program, voluntary committee audits of faculty syllabi, analysis of major/minor demography to inform program development, hiring in underrepresented fields on the faculty, incorporation of DEI work and CDI training into annual evaluations, new race and history reading library)

Director of Undergraduate Studies, UGA, 2015-2017, 2018-2019

Major responsibilities:

- Program and curriculum development, including data collection and analysis
- Development and oversight of recurring series aimed at undergraduates
- Publicity and promotional materials, website development (undergraduate and alumni sections)
- *Ex officio* member of Undergraduate Studies Committee (grade appeals, instruction evaluations, HIST curriculum design, undergraduate awards); *ex officio* member of Policy Committee

Major achievements:

- Launched and coordinated annual programming for Black History Month in the department, emphasizing student-oriented opportunities (including book clubs, student-driven collective research projects, walking tours, accessible talks by guest faculty).
- Launched and organized the Lunchtime Time Machine lecture series, featuring accessible talks by faculty members geared toward undergraduates of all majors.
- Launched and organized History at Work programming to promote the many potential uses of a history degree. Included authorship of an online guide to the benefits and applications of historical analysis in post-college careers, working with alumni to feature their own career trajectories on the department site, and hosting workshops featuring alumni and humanities advocates to speak with students about their experiences and offer advice.
